Stuart Rose named Emory University trustee

Emory University has named alumnus Stuart A. Rose, a 1976 graduate of the Goizueta Business School, to the university board of trustees.

Rose, a rare book collector, is a longtime supporter of Emory's libraries and a well-known leader in the Dayton, Ohio, business community. Emory recognized Rose's ongoing support and significant gifts to the former Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library in 2015 by naming it the [Stuart A. Rose Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library](#) after a substantial renovation.

In addition to Rose, Atlanta Business Chronicle broadcast editor Crystal Edmonson and Bishop Sue Hauptert-Johnson, episcopal leader of the North Georgia Conference of the United Methodist Church, were also named to the board of trustees.
