Emory digital team bringing "Brotherman" streets to life will appear at Decatur Book Fest



Dawud Anyabwile's 360-degree drawings of neighborhood streets in "Brotherman" are being brought to 3-D life by our ECDS team.

Comic book fans can enter into the virtual-reality streets of "Brotherman: Dictator of Discipline," an African-American superhero comic book, at an [AJC Decatur Book Festival](#) session featuring a digital project team from the [Emory Center for Digital Scholarship](#).

The [Big City Maps](#) panel will take place on Saturday, Sept. 2, 2017, at 12:30 p.m. at the Marriott Conference Center. "Brotherman" artist Dawud Anyabwile and members of the ECDS staff will discuss how they transformed the comic-book streets of fictional Big City into a digital map with 360-degree views. A demo with virtual reality headsets will follow, in which two or three volunteers will interact with the map of Big City. The audience will get to see what the volunteers are experiencing on large screens.

Thurman is the chief strategy officer in the US State Department's Office of the US Global AIDS Coordinator and Health Diplomacy.

Renovations of Woodruff Library Level 1 and health sciences library lobby nearly complete

A renovated Learning Commons will open around Aug. 21 on Level 1 of Emory's [Woodruff Library](#), with comfortable, movable seating, plenty of power outlets, and study pods.

The design includes areas for both individual study and collaborative work. The library has added individual study pods, booth seating, and other options, expanding student work space to more than 20,000 square feet.

At the [Woodruff Health Sciences Center Library](#), a new service desk with a consultation area and a renovated lobby with chairs and an accessible turnstile entrance are among the changes that will debut around the opening of the fall semester.

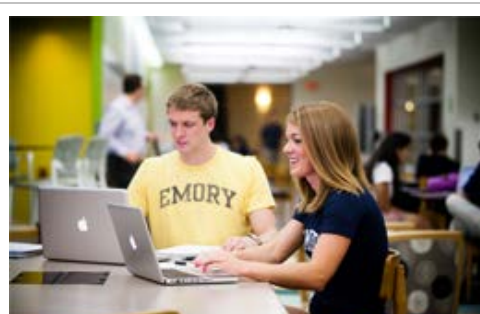
